Before every baptism I do, I have a short baptism refresher class with the parents. And one of things I tell them is what Luther wrote about baptism in the Large Catechism. He said that our baptism is like an unsinkable ship. It won't sink because it was built by God. But life can be like a storm that rocks that ship, and sometimes it washes us overboard, and it feels like we're drowning. But that ship is still there. It will not sink. So, Luther writes, "Those who do fall out should immediately see to it that they swim to the ship and hold fast to it, until they can climb aboard again."

I like that image because it means that no matter what happens to us, we have that promise to fall back on. Even if our world falls apart around us, even if we feel like nobody cares about us, we have that promise that God loves us. And that promise will always be there for us. Even if we don't love God, God will love us, and that's a lifeline for us when we're drowning. If we cling to it, it will save us.

It's at those times that Jesus reaches down and pulls us back onto that unsinkable ship. He looks us in the eye and speaks right into our soul, "You are a child of God, you are loved, and that is enough."

And that's why baptism is the absolute bedrock of our faith. We have been baptized. We were washed in the cleansing waters of the Father, marked with the cross of Christ forever, and sealed by the Holy Spirit. We were given the name "Child of God," and no one can ever take that away from us. It's our identity. It's who we are, and more importantly, whose we are. We belong to God.

Every time we remember our baptism, it gives us another chance — a chance to start over, to be resurrected with Christ, to let God's grace prevail. Baptism is an unsinkable ship. We have a God of good promises. And good promises are powerful. They have real meaning for our lives today.

That's why we have decided to celebrate our baptisms here at First! You have heard at every one of our baptisms that we ask parents to celebrate the anniversary of their child's baptism every year, and we are going to take our own suggestion.

Beginning in August, we will celebrate the Baptismal Anniversary of every member of our church. Each month, in the newsletter, we will publish the names of everyone that was baptized in that month – everyone that we have a baptism date for – and we'll invite each one to come and celebrate their Baptism Anniversary month with us. Then, one Sunday each month, we'll call those who have their anniversary that month to come forward to the font as a group to remember what a great gift their baptism is to them, and what a great gift they are to their church.

Obviously, we do not have in our records the baptism date for every one of our members who were baptized in other congregations. We ask, if you do know that date and notice that we have not published it or invited you that month, please inform the office of the date, so we can add it to our records.

But you don't need to wait to be invited to celebrate your Baptism Anniversary! When we call forward everyone who was baptized that month, you can join the group.

Even if you don't know when you were baptized, a good rough estimate is to pick a date 6 weeks after your birthday. You can join the Baptism Anniversary that month!

Beginning in July, watch your mail or email for your invitation for your month. Let's celebrate! I can think of no better reason to come together than to recognize the day you became a member of the family of God!

Music, Faith, and Healing

What is music? Music is a language of symbols that has a depth that words do not. Music is like poetry with symbols and rhythm. It is an art form with rhythm and melody used in liturgy, prayer, praise, and celebration. Look at Psalm 150- celebration with cymbal, string, pipes, trumpet, lute, timbrel, harp, and dance. Or look at 1 Samuel 16: 23 where David took his lyre and played for Saul and refreshed him. Also in Zephaniah 3: 14,17 where the Lord delights in you with singing and rejoicing But not all music is praising. It is also lament. The Psalms are poetic songs that praise and lament.

Music can be associated with words and serves multiple functions- it enables words to have deeper meaning, aids memory, and is highly associative with other occasions. Singing a familiar tune brings back memories of another time and place and emotion. It can also increase cognitive ability, reduce agitation, help to regain speech, help us move, and decrease pain by releasing dopamine (a feel good chemical in the brain). Music can transform one's well being. Music can also satisfy the human need of self expression and pleasurable feelings.

When we sing, we are engaged in a holistic experience- body, mind, and soul all working together to produce sound. Music involves the whole person through singing,

moving, dancing, and gesturing. Music is good medicine; it helps you breathe deeper and release pent up anxieties. Words we sing together shape us; our beliefs, attitudes, values, and faith. We sing out what we treasure about God. Words have power to uplift and heal. The heart is the place where our whole being comes together; body, mind, and spirit. By singing together we connect with a greater community.

Music is an integral part of worship. We start with the prelude to prepare our hearts for worship. Liturgy is the work of the people. Music serves God's Word and the Sacraments and liturgy. Voice and sung text are the primary instruments in worship. Singing is a communal, relational activity that helps to unify the church. Hymns stir memory, nurture faith and spiritual growth, and form the rhythms of the church year. Other instruments aid the singing voice. Playing an instrument is a multi tasking activity using executive function and memory.

Music connects human souls; speaking a language that needs no words. Music is comforting and beautiful. The secret of music makes the world quieter; silence enhances music. We thank the Lord for the gift of music.






The church office will be closed for the July 4th holiday.

I'm writing to you from the front porch of our house, as the breeze blows the palm trees and cools the air. This is rainy season in Liberia. This year's rainy season is cold and hot, a bit unusual. This will be my last Newsletter as an ELCA Missionary to Liberia. I am retiring as of the end of this year, December 31, 2024. My time with Global Mission in Liberia ends on June 30, at which point I will travel to the U.S. for a period of 5-6 months of visiting sponsors, family, friends, and planning for the next chapter of my life. My husband, Bishop-Emeritus Jensen, and I will be settling here in Liberia. I have been an ELCA pastor for thirty-one years. During that time God called me to serve in suburban and urban Chicago (Resurrection-Franklin, Park, Zion, southside Chicago, Trinity-Park Forest and the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago) and lastly as an ELCA missionary to the Lutheran Church in Liberia. The calls have been interesting, challenging, and always showing glimpses of God's grace and presence in the world. This last chapter of my life has led me to amazing ministry opportunities here in Liberia, and also sharing about Liberia in the U.S. and on-line world wide. I thought for this last newsletter I would share highlights of the last 9 years and what's ahead for me in this retirement. I'm a photographer. 

In comparing General Fund income with actual expenses, you will see a shortfall of \$13,174. This compares to last month when the shortfall was \$12,786.

General Fund offering for May was \$29,114. Historically, May results in 8.45% of general fund giving. This amount would be \$37,607.
