We're Epiphany People

It's been said that we Christians are an Easter (raised to new life) people. We are also a Christmas (God born in us) people. But we mustn't forget that we are also an Epiphany people. What do Epiphany people look like? Well, there's a message I'd like to share with you by another pastor who was a kind of mentor to me, Pastor Mark Nygard.

I ran out of money this week. Not that I didn't have money in the bank, but I had used up the cash in my wallet and had forgotten to recharge it. I didn't discover it until I entered Burger King to buy a meal for John (his son) and me.

"I'll have two Whopper combos, one medium and one small," I confidently ordered. "Two combos, one medium and one small," she called back to the kitchen. Entering it into the cash register, she told me the amount due. Opening my billfold, my heart sank as I saw it full of receipts and lean on bills. Pawing through the receipts, I came up with only some stray dollar bills and some change, "I'm not going to have money enough to cover this," I said with some embarrassment. "I'll have to cancel." "Void the combos," she called back without a moment's hesitation. This must happen to them often.

Then, turning to me, she said, "I have four dollars," offering to complete the money I needed. "I shouldn't take help on an order like this," I protested. "Well, I have four dollars," she offered again. I thought of John, hungry, out in the car waiting for me. I was only a little short on just one order. I offered, "Could you complete a single order?" And she did. But she took only some of my money, completed it with one of her dollars, and gave me back the change. "Who's doing this?" I protested. "I want to pay you back." "Oh, that's all right," she replied matter-of-factly. "It's part of my Christian moral values."

Here was a teenager who was standing up to be counted. In the most natural way possible, she let it be known where she stood and who she belonged to. She lifted my evening more by her witness than by her dollar. She was an Epiphany person, a light shining in the world and the darkness has not overcome her because Christ is shining within her (John 1:5).

As Christians, we are all called to be Epiphany people. We have experienced the love of God in Jesus Christ. We live in a hard world, where lovelessness is the corollary of competition. We are surrounded by people who have been beaten down by the competition and by a host of other problems: poor health, discord at home, physical or emotional abuse, failing grades at school, the plain old bad day, or maybe even just forgetfulness to recharge their wallet. Our hearts go out to our neighbors in need (and who isn't in need in one way or another at some moment in their day). We have a chance to show we care: by a visit to the hospital, by a cup of coffee with them, by a kind word, by a moment of our time, by our gift of money. We're Epiphany people. We do what we can.

Loneliness has become a public health crisis. The surgeon general stated in May 2023 that human connection is essential for survival. God created each of us to be in relationship with Him and one another. Ecclesiastes 4: 9-12 says two are better than one; a three-fold cord is not quickly broken. Genesis 2:18 says it is not good that man should be alone. The Psalms express voices crying out in loneliness to God. What is loneliness- a painful, subjective feeling of not belonging and despair; feeling forgotten with loss of companionship; feeling that no one cares and the future holds no promise. Loneliness is different than solitude. Loneliness is starvation, but solitude is a positive feeling and choice that sustains us. There are people at higher risk than others to be lonely. Teens, young adults, aged, people with chronic disease; and people marginalized by society due to gender (females more than males), race, class, poverty, and religion can all be at higher risk for loneliness. Loneliness also occurs with life transitions, ie loss of a loved one, empty nest syndrome, changes in employment, health issues, caregiver role, new baby, moving, war, disability, and disasters. Social media can also separate people. A hospital can feel impersonal where one especially needs comfort during illness and the unknown. Long term loneliness affects physical and mental health leading to depression, suicide, and chemical abuse,

dementia, heart disease, and stroke. So what needs to be done to alleviate loneliness? Connect with other and be present for each other. Listen to each other. Healthiest communities have a well-resourced civic infrastructure. The most under resourced areas are the US-Mexican border, black belt region, Appalachia of poor whites, and Native Americans. Community planning is needed for people to gather. The social infrastructure is an ecosystem of opportunities for connection and participation. Older adults in rural areas report having larger social networks than urban areas; but rural areas have more structural barriers to connection. These barriers are transportation, economics, pedestrian challenges, access to internet and cell phones, and restricted access to health care. This infrastructure can include:

- a. programs for volunteering, sports groups, religious groups, and member associations.
- b. policies for transportation, housing, and education.
- c. physical elements such as libraries, parks, green spaces, and playgrounds that support development of social connection.
- d. private businesses such as cafes, barber shops, radio stations, and newspapers.

Compassionate communities offer grace. Remember, God is the ultimate giver of grace. Ps 139:1-12 says we are never alone. God is omnipresent. Matt 28:20 says He is with us always. Hebrews 13:5 says never will He leave us.

Be kind to one another.

And while we are showing our caring, we look for ways to speak our faith like the young woman at Burger King. Think how that might happen for you. Maybe, "God bless you, now," as you send relatives off on a trip. Or, "Jesus loves you," to your kids as you kiss them goodnight. Or, "That was quite a sermon the pastor preached on Sunday," while you're visiting at the coffee-shop. Or, "I don't know how people who aren't Christians manage," in conversation with friends after laying your loved one to rest. Or, "Once upon a time, Jesus was walking down by the lake," as you start teaching a Sunday school lesson to your first or second grade class. Or, "It's just part of my Christian values," as you debate a point with your fellow workers at the office. Or, "Do you know what's been a big help to me: my faith in Jesus," to the passenger next to you on the plane who has just poured out his problems.

Our witness to Christ requires a demonstration of love. But it requires more than that, too. Sometimes, not all the time, it requires an identification of that love that we've demonstrated, so that people may know which light is shining and may come to that light. I say to you: Dare to name the Name. Do it in a way that is natural to you. Pray for grace to know when the moment has arrived and how to share it in a helpful way. Trust the Holy Spirit to help you. But be bold and cheerful in standing up for the One who loved you and died for you. For that's just part of the life of the Epiphany person.

Good, huh? What's an Epiphany person? It's someone who let's God's light shine through them. Do you know what it's called when two or three of these people get together to let their light shine? A church. First Lutheran is an Epiphany people.

Stewardship Ministry Report – January 2025

It began with an idea, a hope, then conversations and discussions and then a meeting and many meetings that followed. And the fruit of all that resulted in the Aitkin Youth Center opening its doors on Thursday and Friday, December 12th and 13th at First Lutheran Church.

Your Mission Endowment Fund Committee was at the heart of this youth center happening. At a meeting two years ago the hope was shared that grant money from the Endowment could be used to build something that would have lasting impact in the community. The Endowment Committee, on the basis of conversations with community people, decided that providing grant money to help establish a youth center would have long-range ramifications to the Aitkin area youth community.

Six people gathered in the church library in May of 2023 and from that a board of directors was formed, a 501c3 organization was formed and registered with the State, local organizations donated money and the process of forming a youth center moved forward. All through the process, First Lutheran supported being the site.

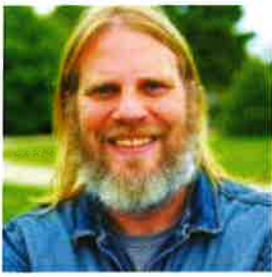
Essential to this process was the Mission Endowment Fund Committee committing eventually \$4,200 for startup costs and First Lutheran Church being willing to allow the center to meet in its building. Money and place were two basic needs. Community involvement was the third component.

As a result, on the two coldest nights of the fall, 25 youth ranging from 6th Grade to 12th Grade came to the Aitkin Youth Center and had very good experiences. A hope turned into reality by the bold decision of the Mission Endowment Fund Committee and the equally bold actions of a number of people from First Lutheran Church and the community.

When people are asked whether they know about the Endowment Fund they often don't know. When asked if they would contribute to it either with a donation here, now and again or with larger amounts from an estate or will, they wonder, "What is this about?"

It's only a start, but twenty-five youth from our community have tasted a place of fun, of acceptance, of warmth, of caring, of it being "Ok" to be who you are, to being presented with opportunities for growth---because people in First Lutheran Church believed in investing in the Mission Endowment Fund, that has made the Aitkin Youth Center a reality!

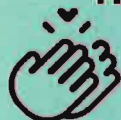

In comparing General Fund income with *actual* expenses, you will see a shortfall of \$30,014. This compares to last month when the shortfall was \$34,832.

In using the straight- line method of calculating the budget, general fund income was about \$79,829 under budget.

Using the historical average method of calculating the budget as shown above, you will see that the variance was a negative \$60,173.

Regular offering was \$43,143 under budget expectations through November, and less than 2023 by \$10,826.

General Fund offering for November was \$37,457. Historically, November results in 9.29% of general fund giving. This amount would be \$41,345.
