## Sermons at First Lutheran Church (ELCA) Reggie Denton, Pastor

May 26, 2024 (Holy Trinity Sunday, Year B)

Today is Holy Trinity Sunday. This is a day that has been celebrated in the Christian church since the 9th century. This is the day we get to talk about the Trinity, about WHO God is. So to begin, I have a little instructional video for you.

(Show St. Patrick's Bad Analogies)

I show that video <u>EVERY</u> year on Trinity Sunday. It's a reminder that every time we try to <u>EXPLAIN</u> God, <u>DEFINE</u> God, we fail miserably. It took the brightest and best of the church over 300 years to come up with our creeds, and Christians have been trying to understand them ever since.

I'll admit it (and any pastor telling the <u>TRUTH</u> will agree with me), Holy Trinity Sunday is the most <u>DIFFICULT</u> Sunday of the <u>ENTIRE</u> church year to preach. It's because this Sunday is the <u>ONLY</u> Sunday devoted <u>EXCLUSIVELY</u> to a <u>DOCTRINE</u> – not a story, not an event, not even a commemoration of a person, but a <u>DOCTRINE</u>.

Now, doctrines are supposed to <u>EXPLAIN</u> things. But not <u>THIS</u> doctrine, not the <u>TRINITY</u>. You can't <u>EXPLAIN GOD</u>, so by <u>DEFINITION</u>, you <u>CAN'T</u> explain the Trinity.

But that's okay, because our <u>FAITH</u> in God <u>NEVER WAS</u> intellectually assenting to a set of <u>PROPOSITIONS</u> about who God is anyway, because <u>GOD</u> never <u>WAS</u> a set of propositions.

You see, the doctrine of the Trinity isn't as much about <u>WHO</u> God is, as it is about <u>WHAT</u> God <u>DOES</u>. <u>GOD LOVES</u>. God is <u>INHERENTLY</u> communal. God <u>IS</u> relationship. God <u>IS</u> love. One God in three persons, whose shared, mutual, and sacrificial love overflows and spills out into the <u>WORLD</u> for <u>ALL</u> people. God <u>IS</u> community.

And we, who are created in God's image, <u>CRAVE</u> that <u>SAME</u> community. We are knit together in our mothers' wombs with a <u>NEED</u> for love.

I heard a speaker say once that young people today don't need the <u>CHURCH</u> for community anymore; they can consume community <u>ANYWHERE</u> these days. I suppose that with the rise of so many technologies that claim to <u>FACILITATE</u> communication, you might <u>THINK</u> that – that we would feel <u>MORE CONNECTED</u> than people in decades and centuries past. But the facts don't bear that out.

Around 2018, before Covid hit, a survey conducted by the health insurance company Cigna concluded that "Americans are a lonely lot." Over 50% of those surveyed responded that they "feel alone or left out always or sometimes." The survey results also suggested that the average sense of loneliness is progressively <a href="HIGHER">HIGHER</a> as you look at younger and <a href="YOUNGER">YOUNGER</a> generations. We <a href="COMMUNICATE MORE">COMMUNICATE MORE</a> than at any time in human history, but we're <a href="ALSO">ALSO</a> becoming more and more lonely.

And that trend has gotten MARKEDLY WORSE AFTER Covid. We returned to public life, but we are even MORE ISOLATED.

How can that be? How can we spend so much time with other people and not feel connected? Because <u>COMMUNICATION</u> is <u>NOT</u> the <u>SAME</u> as <u>CONNECTION</u>, and not the same as <u>COMMUNITY</u>.

This is what sets the church apart. Most communication these days is limited to people with whom you <u>KNOW</u> you agree, who like the same things, who <u>THINK</u> like you. But community in God's <u>CHURCH</u> is <u>COMPLETELY</u> different. In the church, we gather with people we <u>MAY DISAGREE</u> with; we gather with people who may <u>THINK</u> in <u>COMPLETELY DIFFERENT</u> ways than <u>WE</u> think; we gather with people we may not even <u>LIKE</u> all that much. But we gather with them <u>ANYWAY</u>, because

our gathering isn't <u>ABOUT US</u>; it's about the <u>ONE</u> in <u>WHOSE NAME</u> we gather. <u>CHRISTIAN</u> community is about something <u>BIGGER</u> than us, something more <u>IMPORTANT</u> than us.

And so today God isn't demanding that we believe something; God is inviting us <u>INTO</u> the SHARED love and life of the Trinity.

God's <u>VERY BEING, WHO GOD IS</u>, this one-God-in-three-persons, reveals that God is <u>ALL ABOUT COMMUNITY</u>. And since you were created in God's image, and baptized in the <u>NAME</u> of that triune God, <u>YOU</u> are meant to be in community too.

You know that sign of the cross that we make every time I say the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit? There's <u>ANOTHER</u> <u>MEANING</u> for that gesture. As you make the sign of the cross, remember these phrases:

God in my head

God in my heart

God on my left

God on my right

We talk a lot in church about getting God <u>RIGHT</u> in our heads, and getting right <u>WITH</u> God in our hearts, but when you are sitting in a church sanctuary, what is on your right <u>SIDE</u>? And on your left? Another person. You online worshippers, imagine the <u>FEELING</u> of this worship space. We <u>ALL</u> have people, fellow believers, on our left and on our right. In Christian community, God <u>CONNECTS</u> us with those people and binds us together. We are all one in Christ, through our baptism.

And the <u>TRUTH</u> about God is that God tells us <u>MORE</u> about himself through our <u>NEIGHBORS</u> than in <u>THOUSANDS</u> of years of creeds and classes. Even as a pastor, I can say that I've learned more about God from knowing <u>CHRISTIANS</u>, than I could have learned from <u>ANY</u> book.

We are all figuring this out together. We learn who God <u>IS</u> by <u>SEEING</u> God in one another. We were made in God's image to <u>BE IN COMMUNITY</u>. God <u>IS</u> community. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, we are one. Amen.
